Wiltshire Group Holiday.

Five thousand five hundred years of history. Henges, barrows, canals, railways and ancient woodlands. Nine days walking from Saturday 17th to Sunday 25th September. The terrain includes hills from 300 to 670 ft ascent and descent. This is slightly more strenuous than our Shellingford walks. Please book your own accommodation in the area. There is no obligation to attend all nine walks. Arrive and depart when you like to suit your commitments.

Neil will be leading the walks but if you prefer to "go it alone", all the walks have been shared on Wikiloc. Use their smartphone app to follow the trails.

THE WALKS SEPTEMBER 2022

10 a.m. starts. 2 p.m. on the Queen's funeral Monday.

5 to 8.5 mile walks.

- 1) Great Bedwyn and Crofton Pumping Station, Canal and Rail - 7.7 Miles.
- 2) Calne and Bowood Lake - 8.4 Miles
- 3) Avebury, Silbury and West Kennett - 5 Miles. 2 p.m. start.
- 4) Pewsey Downs and the White Horse Trail - 7.5 Miles.
- 5) Amesbury and Stonehenge - 8.5 Miles.
- 6) Calstone Down. A faded white horse. Shorter but hilly - 6.5 Miles.
- 7) Savernake Ancient Forest - 7 Miles
- 8) Devizes, The canal and another white horse - 7.5 miles.
- 9) West Woods - 7 Miles
- 10.1) Old Sarum - 3 miles
- 10.2) Keyhaven and Lymington Marshes - 3.4 Miles

The walks ascend and descend from 300 to 670 feet. For comparison, a typical Suffolk walk might have 150 feet of ascent and descent.

WHEN AND WHERE TO STAY:

Most of the walks are near the old A4 between and including Calne and Marlborough. Also try Devizes or a boat on the Kennet and Avon canal. Please book your own accommodation. Neil will be camping. Visit for all nine walks or just come for a few days. Walks 10.1 and 10.2 are further south and include a drive through the new forest.

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
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

